The answer is that we want to be able to cover the rent and our contractual commitments to speakers if for some unforeseen reason membership were to drop precipitously. So far that has not been a problem, of course!

LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT, CONTINUED

To give you a little background, several years ago we outgrew the Monona Community Center and moved to the West Side Club. We were warned by some members that people would not join if they had to drive so far. However, membership grew to 575 and after three years, we had to find a new home. The Bishop O'Connor Center seemed ideal except for the lights and sound system! We didn't choose to leave but it became necessary when they decided to change the whole focus of the facility.

As we complete our first year at Promega, we have over 600 members. It's exciting to be a part of the largest guild in the country, but that does create its own problems. Because your opinions and suggestions are important to us, we've developed a few surveys and really appreciate the time that you spend answering the questions. There were two surveys about our annual Knit-In. One was largely concerned with the 2015 Knit-In and another was more focused on our direction for the future. We are aware of the issues with the entrance and parking fees and with the food. We are also aware that vendors did not sell as much as they need to for the time that they spent and, in some cases, their travel and lodging costs. Now we have a third survey with questions about the Guild in general (see pg. 5).

I think you should know that some board members have recommended hiring people to do certain tasks for the Guild. Other board members feel strongly that volunteers continue to do the fine work they have been doing since the Guild's beginning in 1981. Important considerations include cost of hiring someone, who would supervise such an employee, and what that would do to Guild dues. However, volunteer burn-out is an issue. I am one of the board members consistently opposed to paying anyone for Guild work of any kind. I don't know how we could say that one board member or committee chair works harder than another. I look at what I do as doing my part for an organization that is extremely important to me. However, I have been on the nominating committee more than once and I know how difficult it is to recruit people to run for the board or to chair a committee. Most people decline. If you've read the newsletters or listened to announcements at Guild meetings, you realize that for several months each year we ask people to call a member of the

nominating committee to volunteer for a position. Not one person called me when I chaired that committee during the 2013-14 season. I am not criticizing anyone for this. Only one person knows all that you have going on in your life! On the other hand, only one person knows if you might secretly wish to do a little more for the good of the Guild! Maybe you'll consider saying yes next year!

Did you know that **Knit Connections** came about as a result of a Guild member saying that she would sometimes come to meetings and talk to no one? The goal of Knit Connections is to provide an opportunity for small group gatherings before our regular meetings. A couple of these gatherings have been very well attended—in fact Stacy Parenteau's presentation on Ravelry before the April meeting was so popular that additional chairs were brought in. People kept coming, however, and ultimately were willing to stand during Stacy's excellent talk. Have you attended any of these meetings? What topics might make you want to come?

Interesting Website: A non-knitting friend recently sent me a link to an Etsy store listing. I don't know how much of the link you need but here is what I have: www.etsy.com/listing/114169397/biological. I wouldn't recommend making one of these items as a critter donation for community projects, but if knitting a dissected frog interests you... a collection of six patterns costs just \$14.95 or you can purchase patterns individually. I will NOT be making one of these items and I am not promoting this particular designer. Just sayin'!

Conclusion—finally! So, what will you be knitting this summer? Going on any knitting trips or to camp? Or does golfing take over your life for the next few months as it does for some of my friends?

I thank you all for your patience and words of encouragement during this year. I never anticipated the personal issues I would face when I agreed to take on the responsibilities of this job. If you feel it's been a good year for the Guild, please thank all the board members and committee chairs as I have tried to do throughout the year. We are so lucky to have such a hard working group of leaders!

MKG BOARD NOMINATIONS

We are pleased to present the following slate of nominations to the Madison Knitters' Guild Board of Directors: Jane Grogan, Amanda Haynes, Stacy Parenteau, and Barbara Rottman. If elected, these Board members will serve a term from July 2015 through June 2018. They replace three departing Board members (Bonnie Dill, Marijka Engel, and Carrie Hafele). Barbara Rottman was appointed to fill an unexpired Board term that ends in June 2015 and is nominated for another full term. According to the bylaws, the Board is responsible to "carry out the affairs of the organization." Your Guild has 11 elected Board members who serve three-year terms and may:

- hold an office (president, vice-president, secretary or treasurer),
- chair a board committee (programming or Knit-In), or
- chair an at-large committee (communications/website, membership, library, special events, education, hospitality, newsletter, community projects, or vendors).

The Board appoints chairs to head up 5 at-large committees not otherwise filled by elected Board members. Appointed chairs serve on a voluntary basis, and their terms are renewed annually but not limited. They may not hold an office or chair the programming or Knit-In committee. That means there are 16 people who serve on the Board, but only the 11 elected Board members may vote on decisions such as adding or deleting programs and the budget and finances. The Board meets monthly. Further, committee chairs meet as needed to plan and carry out their activities.

Board elections will be held at the May annual meeting. Following the general election, the Board holds an internal election of officers and makes decisions about committee chairmanships for the next year. Board members usually rotate position assignments every year. By giving Board members experience in several areas, MKG has a stronger and more nimble Board. There is a transitional period in June with incoming and outgoing Board members reviewing budget proposals and evaluating plans for the coming year.

Please review the summary from each Board candidate in advance of the May meeting. You may submit floor or self-nominations by filling out the <u>Board volunteer interest</u> form.

This month we are adding five books sure to inspire and expand your knitting projects. Two recent books on brioche are filled with innovative brioche patterns. In *Knitting Fresh Brioche* by Nancy Marchant presents 75 new stitch patterns for two-color brioche and in *Brioche Chic* by Mercedes Tarasovich-Clark includes garments and accessories in brioche. If you are looking for other knitting techniques, try *Enterlac* 2 by Rosemary Drysdale. The book contains many fun and challenging projects that use the enterlac in new ways.

To inspire your design and aesthetic intuition see *Artful Color, Mindful Knits* by Laura Militzer Bryant. Learn great strategies for working with hand-dyed yarns, revealing the color repeats and allowing you to control the patterning. Finally, in *Magpies, Homebodies, and Nomads* by Cirilia Rose, enjoy the photographs by Jared Flood of a collection of knitwear inspired by travel, cultural history and modern life.

A special thank you goes to the family of Roberta Preston for their donation of books, patterns, magazines, and yarn to the Guild in her memory. Robbie was an accomplished knitter and a frequent library volunteer. We are adding five of her books to our library including French Girl Knits by Kristeen Griffin-Grimes and World of Knitted Toys by Kath Dalmeny.

Guild member Sally Schaefer has shared her Cool Beanie hat design for adaptation for MKG Community Projects. The hats look great and make use of left over yarn in two or three colors. Use her pattern below, or try this concept of alternating two or three colors with another hat pattern, such as the Rib-a-Roni.

COOL BEANIE designed by Sally Schaefer

Materials:

Needles: 16" circular and dpns in US 4/3.5 mm for very loose knitters to US 7/4.5 mm for very tight knitters

Yarn: Worsted Weight about 1/4 to 1/3 skein for each color used. If using single multicolor yarn it is about 1/2 to 3/4 skein total.

Gauge is not critical; finished hats from 18" to 22" will find a cold head to keep warm.

Notes: Simple pattern, stretchy one-size fits variety of ages. Sally always casts on and knits first row with darker color.

TWO COLOR BEANIE:

Cast On: 90 stitches with darker color (Color A); join, being careful stitches are

not twisted and place a marker.

Row 1: Using Color A, K2, P1 around Row 2: Switch to Color B, K2, P1 around

Continue alternating rows 1 and 2 for 5 1/2 to 6 inches

Decrease Rows:

Row 1: k13, k2 together Row 2: K12, k2 together

Continue decreasing by one stitch in each row, switching to dpns as needed, until 12 stitches remain.

Thread yarn through the remaining stitches and fasten securely.

Weave in all ends.

THREE COLOR BEANIE:

Follow pattern above using three yarns instead of two. Alternate each color in new row, carrying unused colors along at the beginning of a new row.

APRIL GUILD MEETING MINUTES:

President Connie Burmeister called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm. The announcements were:

 The following people have been nominated to serve on the MKG Board: Jane Grogan, Amanda Haynes, Stacy Parenteau and Barbara Rottman. Elections will take place at the May meeting.

• A Knit-In Chair for 2016 is still needed. Lois Anderson thanked members for the comfort scarves they have been making for courageous women entering

domestic abuse shelters. Lois has collected and delivered over 900 scarves in the last five years.

Program: Terry Boyd, Professor Emerita, Dept. of Design studies at UW introduced our speaker, Claire Moran, who is the Academic Curator at the Helen Louise Allen Textile Collection in the School of Human Ecology here at UW. Helen Louise Allen pioneered an

anthropological approach to textiles. She collected samples of textiles but went further by documenting the stages of the various processes involved. For example, instead of just collecting batiks, she also documented the many stages of dying and resist work which result in the finished batik. The Helen Louise Allen Textile Collection was moved to newly renovated space in 2011 within the Human Ecology building; it includes a workroom, classroom and storage area. It is a research and teaching collection with displays rotating every 6 to 8 weeks.



Ms. Moran spoke to us on Non-Knitting Techniques which were precursors to knitting. These included: Nalebinding, which is done with short lengths of yarn; Sprang, made on a loom, lacy, open and stretchy; and Tabletweaving, which was made in narrow bands on a loom. In each

case, these techniques developed in various places around the world.

Ms. Moran presented slides of items from the collection. There were socks, a knitted blanket and a shaker rug. She also brought items from the collections so we could get up close and touch them.

The Guild will be scheduling some guided tours during the summer months for MKG members.

In lieu of a speaker fee, the Guild donated \$500 to the Helen Louise Allen Textile Collection.

- Taine Hatch-Rymer: Fembot by Nikol Lohr using Bernat Boa, Cascade Fixation, Lion Fun Fur, and Crystal Palace Kid Merino. Taine also showed her Rikke Hat by Sarah Young with yarn from the Lemonade Shop, Speckled DK.
- Kristi Gersbach: Pi Shawl by Elizabeth Zimmerman with Pomfret wool bought at December's sale.
- Sue Olson: University of Minnesota Gopher scarf, hat, and mittens.
- Rebecca Boelhower Santi: Drachenfels shawl by Melanie Berg with rosy green wool.
- Lynn Levin showed various Critters knit by MKG members for donation to the Monona Library's Summer Reading Program and the 1,000 Books before Kindergarten Program.
- Lois Anderson presented *Handmade Especially for* You scarves donated to Community Projects.

Dear Knitters: We are excited about upcoming MKG programs for 2015-16. We are in continuous planning mode for programs and have most of the program year planned at this writing. September 14, 2015: Nancy Bush (photo on right) — Partnering with Wisconsin Sheep & Wool, we will host Nancy Bush, a much-published author, teacher and speaker. Nancy is available to conduct up to 3 days of classes for MKG any time between September 15 and September 19. WS&W plans to offer classes on Estonian Lace, Estonian mittens, and Estonian socks plus Twined Knitting. We are planning classes now. If you have any preferences, please let us know!





October 12: Kristin Nicholas — Kristin is noted for bright bold colorwork. She is the author of 10 books, including Color by Kristin, Kristin Knits, and Knitting for Baby. Kristin will be available to teach classes on Monday, October 12 only. We are very lucky to have Kristin appear in Madison. It takes Kristin approximately 7 hours to fly from her home in

Connecticut to Madison, so she is not able to teach any other day. However, this is a Columbus Day, so make your plans now. Classes will soon be posted on the website. Kristin will teach two 3-hour classes with up to 20 students each:

- 1. Embellishing Knits (embroidery on knits)
- 2. The Edge of Color. This class is suitable for beginners and includes how to pick up stitches, mitered edgings, and 1-2 other edgings, depending on class speed.

November 9: Open — Due to family emergencies, our planned speaker had to cancel. We are actively seeking an alternate speaker.

December 14: <u>Judy Tollefson</u> of <u>Judy's Colors</u> (Christmas stockings) — Judy will unveil the "Madison" Christmas stocking at the December meeting. This is a new design created especially for Madison and to represent Madison. Judy will speak about the design process, what inspired her and how she went about creating the stocking. She will offer the pattern and kits at deep discount to guild members. Judy will also teach classes on Sunday and Monday, December 13 and 14, 2015.

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

























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
